

What Makes a Successful Application?

- * Grades
- * Well rounded student
- * Active inside and outside the classroom
- * Voluntary work
- Evidences skills and qualities
- Relates skills and qualities to the degree



What happens to your statement?

* Your statement needs to be checked internally at BHASVIC in order to ensure that it is correct and we will attach your college reference.



 UCAS will send it to relevant universities to be considered by admissions tutors

Personal Statements Why are they so important?

- Important life skill
- University places highly competitive
- Your opportunity to sell yourself
- * Many courses do not interview
- * Better statement = more offers = more choice!



Personal Statements: Style and Appearance

- * This is a formal application
- * 4,000 characters (inc. spaces)/47 lines
- * Think about the structure
- * 5 / 6 paragraphs of equal length
- Write the statement using word processing software and then paste this in to Apply
- * Make sure your spelling, grammar and punctuation are perfect!

Structure

- There is no formal structure for a personal statement, but generally...
- * 70/30 academic/skills qualities

Example structure:

- * Intro: Subject intro, how I made my decision and my interests in the subject
- * S1: Academic subjects studies and how they relate to choice of course
- \$2: Academic subjects experience and wider interest outside the classroom
- * S3: What other related activities I've done and my career aspirations
- * **S4:** Other information about my interests hobbies etc. related to subject and skills
- * **S5:** Conclusion. Sum up what I have to offer and why I should be chosen

Some common mistakes to watch out for

- * Length draft may be extremely long or too short
- * Paragraph order it needs to make sense
- * Too much time spent on hobbies/pastimes you are going to Uni to study and that should be the bulk of your statement
- * Spelling, punctuation and grammar
- * Not enough interest / motivation for the subject

Some common mistakes to watch out for

- * Reasons for course unclear and not at the beginning
- * Transferable skills from other academic courses not highlighted e.g. essay writing skills, data handling skills, organisation, research
- * No reference to **course specific requirements** (e.g. Physiotherapy requires work experience)
- Lots of competition and personal statement not as strong as others

Other things to bear in mind..

- * Plagiarism Google "help with my UCAS statement" and you get over 100 000 hits.
- * UCAS are aware of this and now use **plagiarism software** to detect such things e.g. the 233 medicine applicants whose "love of science" began when as a child they had all burned a hole in their pyjamas
- * If the UCAS software picks out suspected plagiarism your application is **automatically rejected** and you will be informed of this.

Things to include

Although not exhaustive, you should think about the following:

- * What course do you want to study?
- * What interests you about it?
- * How well suited are you to the subject?
- * How are your current studies related to the course?
- * Are you conscientious, hardworking and committed?
- * How will you show enthusiasm for the course?
- * Hobbies? Do you have any career plans that are related?
- * Experiences and interests do you have and how are they related?

Personal Statements What universities are looking for

- * Have they chosen the **right subject** for the right reasons?
- * Can they **survive at university level** are they mature enough?
- * Do they have a **range of interests** and aptitudes?
- * Does the personal statement confirm their **depth of interest** in the subject?
- * What has the candidate **studied independently**?

Summary

- * Why have you chosen this course?
- * Why do you want to go to university?
- * What makes you a suitable candidate?

Transferable skills

- * Hobbies
- * Interests
- Work experience/volunteering
- Previous study

- * Don't just state facts, elaborate on them to explain why they make you a **fantastic candidate**
- * Even better if you can relate this back to the course



- * The only thing we have to fear is fear itself." Roosevelt realised in order to make change, you have to try...


Writing a Personal Statement DO!

- * Be relevant
- * Be **specific**
- * Be original
- * Be honest
- * Be **Engaging**



Writing a Personal Statement DON'T!

- * Don't mention specific institutions
- Don't go mad with a thesaurus
- Don't include irrelevant information
- Don't exaggerate or lie
- * Don't write in lists
- Don't try to include everything
- Don't repeat yourself
