Apprenticeships work differently in Scotland and Wales. The following applies to England.

- Apprenticeships must last at least a year. They can last up to 5 years depending on the level the apprentice is studying (up to Masters level).
- Employers must pay at least minimum wage. Apprentices will NOT get student loans.
- The training and assessment costs are covered, either by the employer levy or 95% via Government funding. There may be extra funding to help the employer to cover the shortfall.
- 20% of time is spent on training- how this is organised will depend, it could be weekly or block placements. Can be delivered online or at a college or university.
- Apprentices can be new or existing staff.
- You can enrol on a degree apprenticeship programme even if you've already got a degree but it must be in an unrelated subject.
- There is no guarantee of a job at the end of the apprenticeship BUT an apprentice will have a vast amount of work-related experience.

How do I apply for an apprenticeship?

- Applying for an apprenticeship is just like applying for a normal job.
- The deadline is down to the employer, you apply directly through them.
- There's no fixed cycle for degree apprenticeship applications. The majority of organisations will begin their recruitment processes in January or February for an August or September start date, but larger organisations will start advertising their positions from the previous autumn onwards and smaller enterprises may wait until spring.
- You can do as many applications as you like.
- You can apply to university through UCAS, while also applying for apprenticeships.

Employers and providers: employers will advertise apprenticeship opportunities through job websites (like Indeed or the websites listed in the section above) and on their own websites and at job fairs. Look at university and college websites to see what kind of programmes they run and who they partner with. You can also encourage an employer to take you on as an apprentice.

Advantages you can mention to employers:

- They can adapt the training according to the needs of their business.
- An apprentice is motivated to learn new skills.
- It's a good way to expand and upskill your workforce.

Degree apprenticeships

GOV.UK apprenticeship figures for the first quarter of 2022/23 (August to October 2022): 22,060 Level 6 (Bachelors) and 7 (Masters) degree apprenticeship starts - a 14% increase on the previous year (19,360), accounting for nearly a fifth (18%) of all apprenticeship starts.

Organisations of all sizes can take advantage of degree apprenticeships, but they are especially common among small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs).

Where can you study?

As the scope for degree apprenticeships expands, so does the range of provider universities and employers. These currently (Jan 2023) include:
