In June 2018 1209 A2 students left BHASVIC to move onto future pathways

Many students continued, or began, new employment & apprenticeships


A2 students can choose the Employability and Enterprise tutorial pathway.

From Sept 2017 to June 2018 we processed 1024 UCAS applications

59% of leavers entered higher education with almost 20% more taking a gap year.

97.7% of BHASVIC students applying to University successfully began a university course, compared with a national figure of 74.5% for post-16 education.

Students went to a total of 102 different institutions



54% of BHASVIC students accepted a place at a high tariff university (including Oxbridge & Russell Group), substantially higher than the national average of 20%.

93% of our students achieve first and 2:1 degrees, substantially higher than the independent, state and sixth form sector in general. For Widening Participation students for all UK universities the figure is 92% compared to 69% for state schools
