# **Information about the History Courses**

At BHASVIC you have two distinct course options:

- Modern History: "Democracy, Dictatorship and Social Change in the Modern World"
- Medieval and Early Modern History: "Conquest, Crusade and Conflict in the Medieval World"

Both courses are **two year linear A levels** which provide a fascinating insight to the past. You will investigate how revolutions, dictatorships and great international and domestic conflicts have shaped our world. You will compare the history of the British Isles with global developments and will consider the impact of hugely controversial individuals like Mao, Stalin, Oliver Cromwell and Saladin.

# What is Studying History Like?


